The Foundation of Forgiveness (Part 2) What is God's forgiveness like?

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Introduction: What does it mean for God to forgive?

- A. This is the basis of our relationship with God! (1 Jn 1:7-9; Mt 26:28)
 - 1. We previously studied that sin is the reason for our separation from God.
 - God had to act on our behalf to provide forgiveness. <u>He is serious about forgiveness!</u> How serious? He gave His Son to provide it!
- B. We make a big mistake when we assume that all understand what forgiveness is.
 - Many Christians <u>struggle with guilt</u> because of a lack of understanding of forgiveness! Some <u>think of God like a man</u>. (Num 23:19)
 - We need to have a clear understanding of God's promises and let His forgiveness give us peace of mind. (Acts 8:38-39; 16:33-34)

I. What happens when God forgives?

A. What is the definition of forgiveness? (Mt 6:12, 14)

Forgive - (1) send off or away, let go (MT 27.50); (2) as a legal technical term divorce (1C 7.11); (3) abandon, leave behind (MT 26.56); (4) of duty and obligation reject, set aside, neglect (MK 7.8); (5) of toleration let go, leave in peace, allow (MK 11.6); (6) of sins or debts forgive, pardon, cancel (LU 7.47);

- There are <u>several actions described</u> by this word: send off, let go, abandon, leave behind, reject, set aside, pardon, cancel and forgive.
 - When God forgives sin then that sin no longer exist as a barrier between you and God! (Isa 59:1-2)
 - 3. Still, men have many questions! Could this sin be brought back by God? Is there something I need to do to keep forgiven? What price do I need to pay?
- B. When God forgives the sin is removed forever.
 - 1. God describes our sins as being cast into the sea! (Mic 7:18-19)
 - 2. Notice that this is a product of the mercy of God. He wants us to win this battle!
 - Have you ever <u>doubted the forgiveness of men</u>? Men often say they forgive but in fact they do not. God is not a man.
 - The <u>holiness of God</u> demands a complete removal of sin.
- C. When God forgives <u>that sin is never remembered</u> as a charge against us for all time. (Heb 8:12)
 - 1. This is why <u>Jesus acts as our High Priest</u>. He wants us to have all guilt removed. (Heb 4:14-16)
 - Nothing delights God as much as when a sinner is forgiven. Repentance always is found before forgiveness! (Lk 15:7)
 - 3. God tells us He blots out our sins! (Acts 3:19; Isa 43:25)
- D. When God forgives He receives us back into full fellowship! (Lk 15:20-24)
 - 1. This is very difficult for men to do. God is not a man.
 - 2. Here is where many Christians can be overcome by guilt. (2 Cor 2:7-8, 11)

 We have lost some because of this. This is why we need a solid understanding of God's character.

II. What should God's forgiveness produce in us?

- A. We should have a joy that fills our hearts. (Psa 51:8-12)
 - We already saw the rejoicing in the book of Acts. This same joy comes for <u>the</u> Christian that repents and confesses his sin.
 - 2. When our relationship with God <u>is our single focus</u> then our forgiveness becomes a "big deal." Do we remember <u>how rich we are</u>?
 - The greatest motivation in evangelism comes from those who have <u>a vivid memory</u> and <u>a vivid joy</u> in what God has done for them. (Mk 5:19-20)
 - 4. Our love for singing has this joy at the foundation! (Jam 5:13)
- B. The love of God will become a power in our thoughts and our choices. (Lk 7:44-47)
 - When we struggle with our priorities we <u>may need to remember our forgiveness</u>.
 - Be honest with yourself: "How much were you forgiven when you became a Christian?"
 - It is very important that we have a genuine conversion. We can grow in our understanding of that conversion over time. We also can forget. (2 Pt 1:9)
 - 4. <u>Do we rejoice</u> with the angels at another's forgiveness or are we indifferent?
- C. The mercy and forgiveness of God will become a part of us as we deal with others. (Mt 6:14-15; 18:33-35)
 - This is one of <u>the biggest challenges we face as Christians</u>. Many let the hurts of brethren dominate them and in time destroy them.
 - When we hold grudges we become <u>hard hearted towards our brethren</u>. There is no excuse.
 - 3. What does our thoughts and words say about how we think of brethren that have hurt us? (1 Pt 4:8-9; James 5:8-9; 2:13)
 - Do we enjoy being with our brethren? If through indifference or bitterness we rarely seek out time to be with our brethren, something is wrong. (1 Pt 1:22)

III. Let us daily remember all that brought about our forgiveness

- A. This memory will keep us humble. (1 Pt 5:5-7)
 - 1. It will help me to see that I am just like my brethren and not a superior looking down!
 - 2. It will help me to make allowances for my brethren.
 - 3. It will help me to speak kind but firm words in dealing with sin and forgiveness.
- B. This memory will produce a heart that finds real meaning in worship. (Jn 4:23-24)
 - 1. What an opportunity to speak and hear words about the One that forgave me!
 - These will have a very different attitude about assemblies. Our attitudes towards God's provisions reflect an attitude towards the blood of Christ. (Heb 10:29)
 - 3. Let each of us help one another to remember! (Heb 10:23-25)

Conclusion: Never be indifferent to seeking the certain forgiveness of God!
