Bringing Together the Generations

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Introduction: We face a great challenge in bringing different groups together.

- A. It takes the wisdom of God to bring us together. (Jn 17:20-21)
 - 1. When we are crucified then we have placed others ahead of ourselves.
 - 2. Satan works to exploit these natural differences. (Gal 2:11-13; Acts 6:1)
 - 3. It takes *little skill to tear down*, but *great wisdom to build*.
- B. *Every generation* struggles with relationships with previous generations.
 - 1. When we work together we can use the wisdom and experience of one generation and *combine it* with the strength of another.
 - 2. John wrote to "fathers, young men and children." (1 Jn 2:12-14)

I. Characteristics of Generations

- A. The age of a generation should bless it with wisdom based on <u>faith and experience</u>. (Prov 20:29)
 - 1. <u>This is not always true</u>! Consider the generation that came out of Egypt and the one that took the promised land. (Heb 3:16-19; Job 32:9)
 - 2. The next generation was led by Joshua and was greatly blessed.
- B. The experience of a generation can be a blessing or a curse.
 - 1. Consider the generation that followed Joshua. (Judges 2:7-10)
 - 2. Some generations have to fight for their faith and gladly paid a price.
 - 3. Consider the early church and then <u>the church a few generations later</u>. (Acts 8:3-4; 2 Tim 4:2-4)
- C. We naturally associate and listen to the generation we belong to.
 - 1. My sports illustrations often <u>need updating</u> for a younger generation!
 - 2. Consider <u>the phases of life</u> and the <u>shared experiences</u> of others. Ponder the differences between a college student and a couple with children?
 - 3. Look at the reaction of two generations to one event. (Ezra 3:11-13)

II. How God's wisdom brings the generations together

- A. There is <u>unselfish communication</u> with all. (Deut 32:1-7)
 - 1. A *love for the truth* will train one to have an open ear.
 - 2. Love for one another helps us to listen carefully. (Prov 18:13)
 - 3. I will never forget the patient listening of older men of experience.
- B. Respect is taught in the home and in our assemblies. (Lev 19:32; Prov 20:29)
 - 1. My Dad taught me *to respect authority* and those in position of authority.
 - 2. <u>My generation</u> had this drilled into our heads! This reflects the wisdom of God. (Rom 13:1-2, 7; 1 Peter 2:13-15)
 - 3. This respect extends to those who are older. (Lev 19:32)
 - 4. You will find a corresponding respect in those that <u>first</u> respect the completeness of scripture! (1 Cor 14:37)

III. How Satan sows discord between the generations

- A. Absalom serves as an example of one who took advantage these differences
 - 1. He <u>majored in criticism</u> without ever having to take on responsibility.
 - 2. He could "preach it round or flat!" (2 Sam 15:2-4)
 - 3. He <u>took advantage of the hurts</u> of others and nourished them!
 - 4. This would appeal to a younger generation who fought no battles.
- B. Absalom showed no reverence for God and His word nor for his father David.
 - 1. He *openly discarded the "traditional rules"* of morality. (2 Sam 16:22)
 - 2. A generation that places "relevance over reverence" will follow such men.
 - 3. Absalom never appealed to God and His word!
- C. Absalom and his companions ate the fruit of their "non-traditional" wisdom.
 - 1. Without reverence he did not stand a chance!
 - 2. He should have <u>learned from his dad!</u> (Prov 1:7; 19:20-21)

IV. Each Generation Needs a Godly Leadership

- A. Moses *challenged* the next generation to do what their parents failed to do.
- B. They *had the advantage* of being well prepared by Moses. (Num 33:51-53)
 - 1. He reminded them of <u>who they are</u> and why they should be humble. (Deut 9:4-5)
 - 2. They learned from the *failures of their parents*. (**Deut 9:6-8**)
 - 3. Moses did not appeal to their "self-esteem" in what some call "positive preaching." He appealed to *the nature, warnings and promises of God*.
- C. They <u>had the advantage</u> of being ready to walk by faith. They will fight!
 - 1. Faith will always take you places you did not anticipate. (Josh 3:3-4)
 - 2. One cannot be a disciple of Jesus who wants ease! (Lk 9:62)
- D. They <u>had the advantage</u> of having a leadership that eliminated internal sources of discouragement. (Num 32:6-7)
 - 1. Leaders must lead. They must be proactive and not reactive.
 - 2. Leaders <u>must not be afraid of some leaving</u>. Letting some stay and infect the flock with fear and bitterness is much, much worse.

IV. How will the generations in the church come together?

- A. There are great pressures to <u>restructure the church towards a new generation</u>.
 - 1. Which wisdom will we choose? *It is easy* to split off a younger generation.
 - 2. Generational changes <u>based on the flesh</u> pit us against one another.
- B. In *every decade* there are "non-traditional" movements that arise
 - 1. Discontentment if found with almost everything when <u>anything new is</u>

 <u>praised and the old is ridiculed</u>. (Ex. "Did Jesus wear a tie?" Response

 "Did Jesus wear blue jeans?" Ex "I hate religion but love Jesus.")
 - 2. "Wedge issues" are pushed and *anger is nourished*.
- C. God's wisdom brings us together in a common faith and love. (Jas 3:17-18)

Conclusion: Let each of us humbly seek to serve one another for the glory of God.
