The Place and Work of the Apostles Lesson 4 – The Words Delivered to the Apostles www.ncvchurch.com

Introduction: God has throughout time chosen to communicate in words.

- A. We live in a time where mainline denominations have lost "the battle for the Bible." Most no longer accept the Bible as *the perfect, inerrant word of God*.
 - 1. When that is rejected, then anything the Bible uniquely testifies to is likely to be questioned and rejected. Miracles are commonly rejected as *misunderstandings*.
 - 2. Those who take such a *low view of scripture* begin to see the Bible as a "story" and not containing commandments for every generation and culture.
- B. When we accept that Jesus is the Son of God by the evidence of His resurrection then there is a very <u>logical path all should follow</u>. (Rom 1:3-4, 16-17)
 - 1. Let us look carefully at God's plan to deliver His will through the apostles.
 - 2. No one should reject Jesus as our Lord and savior. (Lk 6:46)

I. God's plan was to deliver words by Jesus through the Holy Spirit to the apostles

- A. Jesus often spoke about words that were delivered to Him from the Father.
 - 1. Jesus would <u>only do</u> those things that He saw the Father do. Without instruction <u>He would do nothing!</u> (Jn 5:19-20, 30)
 - 2. Peter understood that he was to feed <u>only on the words</u> that were given to Jesus. (Jn 6:63, 68)
 - 3. Jesus wanted His followers to understand that <u>the Father delivered his teaching to Jesus</u>. He wanted others to test the source of doctrine! (Jn 7:16-17)
 - 4. Jesus respect for the delivered words of God would lead him *only to act* when the Father gives Him instruction. Jesus would give these same words to us! (Jn 8:28-32)
 - 5. The real test of loving Jesus is how we handle these words! (Jn 14:21-24)
- B. Jesus prepares His apostles to receive these words through a later work of the Holy Spirit. There were <u>several things</u> the Holy Spirit would do. (Jn 14:24-26)
 - 1. The Holy Spirit would give *perfect remembrance* of what Jesus spoke to them.
 - 2. The Holy Spirit would teach them <u>additional things from Jesus</u>. (Jn 16:12-15)
 - 3. This message does not require <u>ability, memory or study</u>. (Mt 10:19-20)
 - 4. Please understand the sobering and powerful *claims of inspiration*!
 - 5. God gave signs to show the apostles were inspired of God. (2 Cor 12:12)

II. The Holy Spirit delivered these words "once for all"

- A. Anything that our God does is *perfect for its purpose*. (2 Tim 3:16-17)
 - 1. To say that a work is done by God is to admit that work is perfect!
 - 2. God delivered <u>words</u> to the apostles that were to be handled very differently than the words of men. These <u>words</u> were holy! (1 Thess 2:13)
 - 3. There were things that were inherently true about these <u>words</u> <u>because they</u> <u>came from God</u> and thus were holy! (2 Sam 22:31)

- B. There are perfect events that are "once for all" in that they will never be repeated or added to. (Heb 9:26-28)
 - 1. Jesus will never need to <u>be born of a woman again</u>.
 - 2. Our physical *death is a one-time event*.
 - 3. Jesus will never have to die for our sins again!
- C. God's message was completely delivered and <u>need not be delivered again!</u> (Jude 3; Mt 24:35)
 - 1. We can understand that there are <u>no modern day apostles or prophets</u>.
 - 2. We are to only build upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets used in the writing of the New Testament. (Acts 2:42; Eph 2:20)
 - 3. God's wrath is revealed against those who try to change *His perfect*, once for all delivered message. (Gal 1:6-9; Rev 22:18-19)

III. The words delivered to the apostles were for every culture and every generation

- A. Peter gave promises that would cover <u>all generations</u>. (Acts 2:38-39)
 - 1. Geography and culture may change but God gave promises that <u>could be</u> understood and obeyed by all men! (Acts 17:30-31)
 - 2. The key was understanding when a man truly spoke from God. You did not need to have an *understanding of the culture it was delivered* to understand it!
- B. The message was carefully delivered by the apostles to all men. (Eph 3:3-5; 5:17)
 - 1. It *could be understood* by the man who read it.
 - 2. This carefully delivered message <u>would not be added to</u> by Jesus, the Holy Spirit or the Apostles as it was delivered! (Gal 1:8)
 - 3. God gave a "form of doctrine" through the Apostles that was <u>for all who</u> are baptized into Christ. (Rom 6:17-18, Acts 2:38-39)
 - 4. This word is called "the faith" and the "apostle's doctrine." (Acts 6:7; Jude 3; Acts 2:42)
 - 5. The promise of Jesus to deliver these words <u>has been fulfilled</u>. How will we respond? (Jn 12:48-50)

- 1. What conclusions should follow when we understand that Jesus was raised from the dead? What does it mean when say that Jesus is Lord?
- 2. Why did Jesus want everyone to know that he only taught the words delivered to Him from the Father? How does that example apply to us?
- 3. What did Jesus promise that the Holy Spirit would accomplish for the apostles?
- 4. When we admit that a message is from God then how would we handle that message compared to a message from a man?
- 5. Did the Holy Spirit completely accomplish this work? How can we know this?
- 6. What are the implications of those who say the Bible cannot be understood unless we have a full understanding of the culture in which it was delivered?
- 7. How can we know that we love Jesus?
