Introduction: Those that *trust God* will find great strength in the trials of life.

- A. This world is a battlefield between *two different ways of thinking*. (Rom 8:1, 5, 13)
 - 1. How can I find the courage and strength to be *different from the world*?
 - 2. I must come to know God and finally yield my life to Him in trust.
 - 3. In lesser ways we do this with crucial relationships. (Ex. marriage)
- B. What will *my future hold*? (Rom 8:18-19)
 - 1. Here is the *acid test* for where we put our trust.
 - 2. "The remarkable thing about God is that when you fear God, you fear nothing else, whereas if you do not fear God, you fear everything else."
 - 3. Let us learn from great examples of faith. (Josh 1:9; Ps 34:4-5)

I. Elijah endured years as an isolated "trouble maker."

A. All of us are born into *our own worldly generation* with common ways of thinking.

- 1. Some of the discussion of the generational thinking of "baby boomers, millennials, etc.." has some truth. We are social people and *wish to belong*.
- 2. God's people have always had to *overcome the thinking of each generation*. (Ps 78:8)
- 3. How can a biblical faith be developed in each of us? (1 Jn 5:4-5)
- 4. We can only help our generation by *<u>putting God first</u>*. (Ps 71:18-19; 73:15-17; Acts 13:36)
- B. King Ahab was *a popular leader* with the people. (Jer 5:31)
 - 1. He had <u>no concept of sin and shame</u>. God's standard would be despised and those who spoke it. Riches, power, negotiation and intimidation were his way.
 - 2. What <u>God saw</u> and what <u>worldly people saw</u> were very different.
 (1 Kgs 16:30-33)
 - 3. In any generation there would be no peace between those who served God and those who in "common sense" *sought peace with the world*!
- C. God had Elijah speak out. (1 Kgs 17:1)
 - 1. God is presented as "the Lord God of Israel" and is described as he that "lives."
 - 2. This had to *startle and disturb Ahab*.
 - 3. Elijah stated that it was God "before whom I stand." *Our God He is alive*!
 - 4. God's power would be demonstrated. Imagine the horrible drought.
 - 5. The word Ahab had forsaken would now be against him. (Josh. 23:16)
 - 6. For years *there seemed to be no consequences*. Many draw wrong conclusions.
 - No doubt many in Israel were ashamed of Elijah! Paul understood this challenge!
 (2 Tim 1:7-8)

II. There will come a day where the object of our trust will be exposed

- A. We can learn much *when unwise trust is exposed*. (Isa 20:5)
 - 1. We often are gullible and later look back in shame.

- 2. The experience of *the godly over time* is very valuable. The younger generation needs to understand that God's wisdom is *not just mindless tradition*.
- B. God sought to *bring Ahab and Israel to shame* over their worship of Baal.
 - 1. The drought should have brought all of them to repentance. *It did not however*. (Jer 14:22)
 - 2. Now God will bring a demonstration before all Israel. (1 Kings 18:17-20)
 - 3. Did Ahab know why there was a drought? If Elijah had such power, *where only could it have come from*? Why does Ahab show such hostility towards Elijah?
- C. Real trust in the God who provides takes *<u>a mind that will reason and think</u>*.
 - 1. Satan intimidates and *uses relationships to shut down minds*. Many who proclaim "freedom" often are in a harsh slavery. (2 Cor 3:14; 4:4)
 - 2. Satan's forces *never want an open and fair opportunity to debate*. Darkness is always preferred. God has forced Ahab to this demonstration.
 - 3. Israel under Ahab had become a faithless, cowardly people. (1 Kings 18:21)
 - 4. The forces of Baal were allowed all the time they needed to demonstrate what they could do. (1 Kings 18:22-29)
 - 5. The prophets of Baal were zealous and sacrificial. How was the truth to be determined on this day, *emotion or reason*?
- D. There were two reactions to the powerful demonstration of God. (1 Kings 18:36-40)
 - 1. The people could plainly see that *trusting in Baal had been shameful*. They were fortunate to learn this lesson while still living.
 - 2. Ahab at first appeared humbled. (1 Kgs 18:42)
 - 3. Both Israel and Ahab had built a life on worldly principles. The forces that had molded them *were still there*! In Ahab's case it was *his wife Jezebel*.
 - 4. Ahab was not able to overcome this influence. (1 Kgs 19:1-2)

III. We must learn to never be ashamed of God

- A. Throughout our lives we can see the certainty of trusting God! (Psa 31:1-4; 71:5-6))
 - 1. God tells exactly what He will do and rest assured that He will keep His word!
 - 2. Jesus knew this *as he tasted death*! (Psa 31:1, 5)
 - 2. We learn to think and choose upon a doctrinal core. We are honest and open. (Ps 119:5-6, 46-47, 78-80, 116)
 - 3. Truth brings <u>a willingness to be tested</u> and a life of thanksgiving and praise. This kind of faith is very different from worldly churches. (Ps 71:1, 7-8 NASV)
 - 4. Satan wants to *isolate you and never have your choices tested*. Relationships and passion can become the power that pulls you into darkness. (Ps 1:1-2)
- B. One day we will desire with all that we are that <u>God is not ashamed of us</u>.
 - 1. What will we hear when we stand before God? (Mk 8:38)
 - 2. We must not be ashamed of or cast off those who serve God!
 - 3. We may *need to be ashamed* at how little we know! (2 Tim 2:15)

Conclusion: Repentance can bring <u>a future without shame</u>! (Jer 20:11-12)
