## The Heart of Procrastination

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*Introduction:* The Lord wants us to accurately see ourselves.

- A. God knows us through and through. (Heb 4:12-13)
  - 1. Men often play "hide-and-seek" with their true thoughts and motives.
  - 2. Decision making, priorities and what really motivates us are things that reveal our hearts. Often, we are the last to see what others can!
- B. What moves us to act? What hold us back from what we "should" do?
  - 1. Conversion involves an opening of the heart and yielding to repentance. (Acts 2:37)
  - 2. Proper edification in a local church also opens hearts that have drifted. (Rev 3:13, 18-19)

## I. Procrastination comes from a false view of self and of God

A. What is procrastination?

<u>procrastinate</u> - verb, intransitive, To put off doing something, especially out of habitual carelessness or laziness... verb, transitive To postpone or delay needlessly. [Latin procrâstinâre, procrâstinât-: pro-, forward + crâstinus, of tomorrow (from crâs, tomorrow).] - American Heritage Dictionary

- 1. The root ideal is to *put something off in a needless or careless way*.
- 2. Rooted in the origin of the word is *tomorrow*!
- B. Procrastination comes out of irrationality flawed thinking.
  - 1. It is like one that Satan has blinded. One can "oppose himself!" (2 Tim 2:25)
  - 2. It is not uncommon for one who has struggled with depression to also have struggles here. One can be very intelligent but struggle with self-awareness.
- C. Where *is our real identity*? This is a key foundation in overcoming temptation!
  - 1. At conversion one begins a lifelong process of conforming to God's way of thinking. (Jer 9:23-24; Gal 3:26-29)
  - 2. How did Paul once view himself and his purpose in life? (Phil 3:4-8)
  - 3. I have seen weak members *find purpose in things the world will applaud*. When one's purpose changes, then attitudes towards brethren will also change.

## II. Why do people procrastinate?

- A. Some are <u>not honest with themselves</u> about who they are serving. (Rom 8:5-6)
  - 1. What and whom *do we really love*? (1 Jn 4:16-19)
  - 2. When you passionately love something, *you will pursue it*.
  - 3. Why do we become fearful and paralyzed in doing God's will?
- B. We must come to <u>understand our past and our emotions</u>.
- "People engage in this irrational cycle of chronic procrastination because of an inability to manage negative moods around a task."
  - 1. Can we say that "..we love Him because He first loved us?" (1 Jn 4:16)
  - 2. Here is where an honest, personal study and <u>reflection of God nature</u> and our past can help us! (Ps 22:3-4, 9-10)

- 3. Outside of the knowledge of God, we have been "programmed" to have a self-image *depending on our family and past experiences*.
- C. *Fear, worry* and the "imposter syndrome." (Rev 21:8; Mt 25:25)

"No passion so effectually robs the mind of all its powers of acting and reasoning as fear." -

- 1. Our *fear of the thoughts of others* can be enslaving. Some homes are like this.
- 2. When we know God, we are not afraid of what is true and real.
- 3. Many run from Jesus because of the fear of others! (Jn 9:20-23; 12:42-43)
- 4. "What are brethren thinking about me?"
- 5. Our emotions often make a task *much bigger than it really is*.
- D. <u>Overcommitment</u> and the pressure of the expectations others. (Mt 11:28-30)
  - 1. God knows what we can handle and will not over burden us.
  - 2. Why do good people say yes to commitments that go beyond reason?
- E. *Perfectionism* and one's own expectations.

"Procrastinators are often perfectionists...They're so afraid of not doing something perfectly that they just don't finish it."

- 1. What does God expect? What does our pride demand?
- 2. God urges us to take *one step at a time*. What we consider as weak and flawed, God can turn it into something powerful! (2 Cor 12:8-10)
- 3. When we let go of pride, we can break down a project *into manageable parts*.

## III. Seeking the real expectations of the Lord

- A. God wants us to open our hearts and *love His ways*. (Josh 22:5)
  - 1. Things and people the world rejects, we come to cherish and love. (1 Cor 1:26-27; Jn 13:34-35)
  - 2. Our choices will prioritize the things that God loves!
- B. Why did many <u>refuse</u> the great supper of the Lord? (Lk 14:15-24)
  - 1. How could one refuse a supper prepared by the Lord?
  - 2. Underlying this delay is *a heart that cannot see what is valuable*.
- C. Consider *the empty fruits* of self-centered procrastination.
  - 1. Projects are not finished. (Lk 14:28-30)
  - 2. A kind of character (heart) is formed. (Lk 14:24)
  - 3. There is little joy of accomplishment.

Mr. Meant-to has a comrade
And his name is Didn't-do,
Have you ever chanced to meet them?
Did they ever call on you?
These two fellows live together
In the house of Never-win
And I'm told that it is haunted
By the ghost of might-have-been.

- 4. You are not honest with yourself. (1 Cor 8:1-3)
- 5. You lose the respect of friends and family. (Lk 14:29-30)
- D. Consider the blessed life of the one that fully gives himself to God! (**Heb 11:35-38**) *Conclusion*: Heaven is a place for those who loved the Lord above all else.
