Holy, Holy, Holy – Isaiah 6 and 40

I. Introduction

- a. The word 'holy' is repeated throughout the Bible. It applied to the people of God and most importantly to God Himself.
- b. The phrase 'holy, holy, holy' is only found in two places of Scripture: Isaiah 6 and Revelation 6
- II. Defining Holy
 - a. 'To be blameless in character; to be separate to God; sanctified
 - Applying holiness to God means that He is not only blameless,
 righteous, just, etc. He is epitome of these ideas and goes beyond
 them past anything we can imagine!
 - b. We will never fully grasp the holiness of God.
- III. God is Holy in Power and Wisdom (Isaiah 40)
 - a. His power is impossible to measure (ls. 40:12, 22, 26)
 - i. Water in the hollow of His hand
 - ii. Measured heavens with a span
 - iii. Calculated dust of the earth in a measure
 - b. God's wisdom is beyond our comprehension (ls. 40:13,14)
 - i. We have to put in so much effort to learn just a fraction of knowledge

and wisdom! God knows it ALL because it ALL comes form Him!

- c. Our God is not anything of man. We are dealing with the One who created man (Rom. 11:33-36)
 - i. God is so far removed from our ways and that distance continues to grow with every second.
- IV. God is Holy in Righteousness
 - a. We are not worthy to stand before God (Is. 6:1-5)
 - i. When we honestly look at ourselves before God, we will be like Isaiah.
 - b. As soon as we affirm that we are more worthy, we condemn ourselves (Lev.10; Phil. 4)
 - c. As God is holy, we must be also (Lev. 10: 1 John 1:5-7)
- V. God is Holy in Grace and Mercy
 - a. God could have nothing to do with us. But He wants a relationship (Is. 40:10-11; 1:2-4, 16-18)
 - b. Jesus is God's grace and mercy fully expressed to mankind (John 1:14)
 - i. When we envision the cross, yes we think of our sin and the sacrifice made for us. But we ought to also consider the enormity of God's grace and mercy.
 - c. God cares for us individually even when we don't care for Him (Ps. 139; 2 Pet. 3:9)
 - i. There are billions of people in the world and God cares for each one individually (even those who want nothing to do with Him).

- d. God sent His Son not only that we might be forgiven. But that through forgiveness we might be changed/transformed (ls. 6:6-7)
 - Isaiah's encounter did not give him license to sin after being "purged of sin." The attitude he showed of being in the wrong and wanting to change is where it starts.
 - ii. After we choose to follow Christ at the start, our continual attitude thereafter should be, "Here am I, send me."
 - iii. The transformation/change God wants is one that takes a lifetime to produce. It is well worth it!
