Knowing The Way Home

Introduction: It is a frightening thought to not be able to go home!

- A. It is possible through neglect to be away from the protection of God!
 - 1. When we are "at home" with God no force can remove us! (Rom 8:35-37)
 - That place called "home" is <u>an active way of walking</u> (living).
 (Jn 10:27-28; Heb 11:6)
 - 3. When we walk by faith we can have the full assurance of God's fellowship.
- B. We need to see the real danger of the thinking that pride can put in our hearts.
 - 1. Imagine the Son of God saying this to us personally. (Lk 22:31-33)
 - 2. We can talk a good fight and not listen to God's warnings.
 - To be away from "home" is a place of real danger. Consider the nation of Israel in the book of Hosea.

I. How can one "leave home?" - Consider the example of Israel

- A. They let someone else study and discern God's word for them. (Hosea 4:1, 6-11)
 - 1. The first actions of Jeroboam should have brought a swift reaction from the people.
 - 2. When some says "it is too much for you" what are they really saying? (1 Kgs 12:28)
 - 3. With the Northern Kingdom starting like this, how <u>hard would it be for a future</u> <u>descendant</u> to take a stand against these actions? "Fellowship in time will determine practice."
- B. They became *filled with pride* and fought God. (Hosea 5:3-6)
 - 1. It is very difficult to break away from sin when pride prevails.
 - 2. Pride causes blindness and is the worst kind of deception. (Gal 6:3, 7; Rom 1:21-23)
 - These people would have <u>talked about serving Jehovah</u> and that they were wiser than Judah who stuck to the "traditional worship in Jerusalem."
 - 4. Proud people do not want to be corrected. The people of Israel fell in line.
- C. They were unstable, only taking brief stands for what is right. (Hosea 6:4-7)
 - These people were like Judah was in the days of Josiah, they could be manipulated by circumstances to occasionally do right.
 - How should they have built a foundation that would <u>produce a consistent life</u>? (Hosea 6:1-3, Mt 7:24-25)
- D. When we leave God it is likened to Harlotry.
 - 1. This is not just a "moment of weakness." God wants His people to see the great pain they were causing Him. (Hos. 1:2; 9:1)
 - 2. God will not allow such a people to have fellowship with Him. (Hosea 2:2; 1:9)
 - In spite of this great sin, <u>God does not give up on Israel</u>! Gomer, after leaving Hosea, is later bought from those who used her as a slave. (Hosea 3:2-3)
 - 4. He paid thirty pieces of silver, the price of a wounded slave! (Ex 21:32)

II. The first step home is to remember the character and past actions of God

- A. God described His rescue of Israel being <u>like a cast off newborn in a field</u>.
 (Ezk 16:4-5)
 - 1. We live in a world of "throw-away people." This is not so with God.
 - Listen carefully to what our God is like. He wants to heal, cleanse and provide for the utterly helpless ones! (Ezk 16:7-13)
 - 3. Some view God's covenants as "rules and legalism." They do not know God.
 - If we would keep God's love fresh in our thoughts we would never become indifferent.
 - 5. Remembering our God is always the first step back. (Lk 15:17-18)
- B. We must learn to serve and be blessed by a holy God! (Lev 11:44-45; 19:2; 20:26)
 - 1. Anyone in a covenant of God lives a lifetime of teaching and change.
 - What a tragedy when men fear the anger of other men rather that plainly teach the Holy ways of God. Blessings and holiness <u>must be found together!</u>
 - 3. Within the paths of holiness are provisions of forgiveness. Many will turn away.
 - Those who <u>yield their spirits to God</u> will find "the secret of the Lord." You will never regret trusting God. (Ps 25:12-14)

III. The only way home comes through repentance that leads to complete obedience

- A. God does not give up on anyone.
 - 1. Imagine the scene as Hosea redeems Gomer from the slave auction block!
 - 2. Does God's love towards me personally depend on my actions? (Rom 5:6-10)
 - 3. How can this knowledge help me turn back to God?
 - How <u>can this knowledge be perverted</u> to drive me further away from God? (Rom 2:3-5)
- B. When one understands God's nature they come to understand <u>unchangeable</u>, <u>dependable</u> <u>truths</u>. (Hosea 14:1-3)
 - 1. Some are blessed to finally understand that men will let them down.
 - When one finally approaches God with "nothing in my hand" but a plea for His mercy, then God will receive him and bless him abundantly.
 - How <u>much have you been forgiven</u>? Do you see yourselves as Gomer? (Lk 7:40-47; 2 Pt 1:9-10)
- C. The love of God will be a constant force for growth in the restored sinner. (Hosea 14:4-8)
 - 1. God's love changes ones whole life and changes our thinking.
 - 2. How does God's love defeat worldliness? (Eph 3:16-19)
 - What a great blessing to finally realize these truths! (Hosea 14:9)

Conclusion: Let us <u>never leave</u> the God who so loves us!
